

MERRIE DANCERS TOORIE

(knitted hat) is based on a fisherman's kep on display in the Shetland Museum and Archives' Boat Hall, It was knitted about 1950 by an old woman from the island of Yell, who remembered patterns knit by the womenfolk for the fishermen in her family. Such keps were worn when the men rowed to the far haaf (deep sea fishing grounds) in large open boats.

v Merrie Dancers Toorie

The kep has three small patterns but is not a Fair Isle design. I kept the small stars for one band of pattern, just as it is in the kep. For a second band I have combined all three small patterns to form a nine-row pattern. The kep has a dark background with colours that remind me of the northern lights, or 'merrie dancers' in Shetland dialect. and a familiar sight to fishermen. You can blend or contrast any colours found in the merrie dancers for your toorie.

Needles

One set 3.5mm/US4 DPNs or circular needles, 40cm long or your preferred needles for knitting small circumferences in the round, or the size needed to match tension

This pattern provides two different size options. Each size uses a different yarn weight.

Yarn weight 1 (YW1) is Shetland Handspun yarn, Jamieson's DK, and Uradale DK yarns. These are all double knitting weight yarns.

Yarn weight 2 (YW2) is Jamieson & Smith Jumper weight, Jamieson's Spindrift, and Uradale Jumper weight yarns. These are all 4ply or fingering weight yarns.

Shetland Handspun varn kit

Main Colour (MC): Black; 1 x hank

Yarn 1: Light grey; 1 x small hank

Yarn 2: Medium grey; 1 x small hank

Yarn 3: Onion/indigo green;

1 x small hank

Yarn 4: Cochineal red: 1 x small hank www.shetlandhandspun.com

Jamieson & Smith Jumper weight in 25g balls

Main Colour (MC): Shade 36;

2 x 25g balls

Yarn 1: Shade FC46: 1 x 25g ball Yarn 2: Shade FC64; 1 x 25g ball Yarn 3: Shade 78; 1 x 25g ball Yarn 4: Shade FC21; 1 x 25g ball www.shetlandwoolbrokers.co.uk

Jamieson's of Shetland in Spindrift or DK in 25g balls

Main Colour (MC): Oxford; 2 x 25g balls

Yarn 1: Damask; 1 x 25g ball Yarn 2: Fog; 1 x 25g ball

Yarn 3: White: 1 x 25g ball Yarn 4: Rye; 1 x 25g ball

Uradale Yarns in Jumper weight or DK in 50g balls

Main Colour (MC): Graeff; 1 x 50g ball

Yarn 1: Flukkra; 1 x 50g ball Yarn 2: Beremeal; 1 x 50g ball

Yarn 3: Speedwell; 1 x 50g ball

Yarn 4: Moss Heath; 1 x 50g ball www.uradale.com

Yarn Weight 1: 48.5cm (191/4 inches) circumference

Yarn Weight 2: 50cm (1934 inches) circumference

Tension

27 sts and 27 rounds to 10cm over pattern after blocking using Shetland Handspun, Jamieson's DK, and Uradale DK yarns (Yarn weight 1).

Light grev Yarn 2 Medium grey

Yarn 3 Onion/indigo green

Cochineal red



29 sts and 29 rounds to 10cm over pattern after blocking using J&S Jumper weight, Jamieson's Spindrift, and Uradale Jumper weight yarns (Yarn weight 2).

You may need a different size needle to match tension. Please check your tension carefully and adjust your needle size accordingly.

Abbreviations

dec: decrease

inc: increase

k: knit

k2tog: knit 2 sts together as if they were

kfb: knit into the front then the back of the st to inc one st

MC: main colour

p: purl

rep: repeat

st(sts): stitch(es)

s2kp: Slip 2 sts together knitwise, k1,

pass the slipped sts over

Instructions

Instructions are given in [] brackets as follows: [Yarn weight 1 (YW1): Yarn weight 2 (YW2)]

Using MC, cast on [108: 120] sts.

Round 1: *K2, p2; rep from * to end.

2-coloured rib

Reading from right to left, and using the colours indicated, begin working from chart A, working 27 repeats for YW1 and 30 repeats for YW2 across the round. Continue working from chart A, changing colours as indicated, until rounds 1-12 are complete (for YW1, omit rows 6 and 12)

Increases

Yarn weight 1

Round 1: K6, kfb, *k3, kfb; rep from * to last 13 sts, k7, kfb, k5. 132 sts

Yarn weight 2

Round 1: K2, kfb, (k3, kfb) 3 times, *k7, kfb. (k3, kfb) 3 times; rep from * to last 5 sts. k5. 144 sts

Round 2: Knit.

Reading from right to left, and using the colours indicated, begin working from chart B, working 11 repeats for YW1 and 12 repeats for YW2 across the round. Continue working from chart B, changing colours as indicated, until rounds 1-34 are complete.

Decrease rounds

Yarn weight 1

Round 1: *K9, k2tog; rep from * to end. 120 sts

Yarn weight 2

Round 1: *K4, k2tog; rep from * to end. 120 sts

Round 2: Knit

Reading from right to left, and using the colours indicated, begin working from chart C, working 5 repeats for both YW1 and YW2 across the round. Continue working from chart C, changing colours as indicated, until rounds 1-21 are complete.

To finish

Break both threads and pass both through the remaining 10 sts. Draw together and fasten off.

Washing Instructions

Hand wash and rinse in hand hot water. Wrap in a soft towel and press to remove as much water as possible. Stretch over a form of suitable size, e.g. bowl, ball, and leave until completely dry. Steam rib to reduce size if necessary.


